## Concise judgement on the main strengths of learners' achievement Grade: 2

Pupils recognise the Bible as a holy book and know stories about the life of Jesus Christ. They are aware of some of the other world religions and of the customs, rituals and celebrations associated with these. They know of leaders and pioneers such as Gladys Aylward. The pupils display an understanding of what it means to belong to a Christian community and the importance of caring for and respecting others. They have done much to raise money for a variety of charities and others less fortunate than themselves.

# Question 3: How well do learning experiences meet the needs and interests of learners and the wider community?
