Question 1: How well do learners achieve?

• Self-evaluation is based on lesson observations, evaluation of pupils' work, interviews with pupils and analysis of teacher assessments.

Concise judgement on the main strengths of learners' achievement Grade: 2

- KS1 pupils have a good understanding of some places of worship and what happens there.
- They are aware of a number of religious celebrations, e.g. Christmas, Harvest Thanksgiving and Easter.
- They are aware of the celebrations of another religion.
- KS2
- The pupils are able to discuss religious topics well.
- They present services for the rest of the school and for audiences, e.g. Thanksgiving/St David's Day/Christmas concerts.
- They are able to discuss other religions, e.g. Judaism, Hinduism.
- A number of pupils possess a good knowledge of Biblical stories.

A good variety of tasks have been accomplished.

What aspects will be addressed in the next two years?

There is a need to add to the provision in terms of resources – information books, artefacts, service books, etc.

Religious education needs to be included in every theme taught at the school.

There is a need to intensify the studies, e.g. discuss religion rather than learn facts.

Spiritual, moral, social and cultural development.

Question 3: How well do learning experiences meet the needs and interests of learners and the wider community?

- Self-evaluation is based on lesson observations, evaluation of pupils' work, interviews with pupils, and an evaluation of joint-worship periods and PSE lessons.
