I) Details

I.I. What is the name of the policy / service in question?

Invest £3 million to improve the condition of Ysgol Hirael

I.2 What is the purpose of the policy / service that is being created or amended? What changes are being considered?

We are eager to commit £3m from the Sustainable Learning Communities Programme to address the needs of Ysgol Hirael which is the only primary school in Bangor yet to receive any investment as part of Band A or Band B funding. The sum of £3m is based on an estimate of the costs to demolish one Vic Hallam building at Ysgol Hirael which is in a very poor condition and ensure a new building in its place which would meet the requirements of the new Curriculum for Wales and education in the 21st century.

The purpose of the project is to:

• Reduce the inequality in the condition and suitability of primary school buildings in the city of Bangor

- Raising the condition category of Ysgol Hirael to A
- Improving the adaptability and accessibility elements
- Improve the building for potential community use
- Demolish and rebuild one of the school's Vic Hallam buildings
- Ensure a learning environment that meets the requirements of the twenty-first century and Curriculum for Wales.

2) Action

2.1 Who are the stakeholders or partners you need to work with to undertake this assessment?

Gwynedd Council Education Department and Ysgol Hirael

2.2 What measures have you taken to engage with people with equality characteristics, regarding the Welsh language or with communities (either of place or of need) that live with socio-economic disadvantage?

The Bangor Catchment Review Panel (PAD) was established in June 2017 and the panel included representation from schools in the Bangor catchment area. During these meetings, several options were considered for the vision for education in Bangor and discussions were held regarding the poor condition of parts of Ysgol Hirael.

The intention is to engage with stakeholders, including the groups identified once the funding has been confirmed.

2.3 What was the result of the engagement?

The intention is to engage with stakeholders, including the groups identified once the financial element has been confirmed.

2.4 On the basis of what other evidence are you operating?

The Governing Body has expressed their concern about the condition of the current building. A condition assessment by the Maintenance Unit states that the school's condition falls into category C.

Significant upgrading work has been identified for part of the building which is of Vic Hallam construction.

In addition, it would allow a child with disability to have better access to activities outside school as well.
		The Unit will include suitable accessible access for all children, and the needs of any child with a disability will be considered in accordance with the Education Department's Accessibility and Equality policies. It would also include suitable access for parents who have a physical impairment to get in and out of the school safely. The Curriculum in Wales has changed significantly, using a cross-curricular and integrated approach, which enables learners to develop holistically. In response to this, spaces

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		within the school will reflect the need for multifaceted learning.
		We will work to improve the environment for education and the wider community, improving educational outcomes and well-being. The recommendations in the new PAS 6463 are to be considered to make the space inclusive for all by addressing sensory design considerations including lighting, acoustics, flooring and decorations.

The Welsh language	Positive / negative / none	It is anticipated that a significant investment in Ysgol Hirael will create the very best conditions to support the prosperity of the Welsh language among the children and the community and the wider area. It will have a positive effect on the Welsh language, mainly, because there would be more opportunities for children to use Welsh socially and educationally, as the new school will offer better resources for carrying out more activities outside of school hours. Bangor is home to many languages and cultures that make Bangor a multicultural city, Bangor University is a key institution that attracts a large number of students and professionals to the city, and as a result increases the number of pupils in the surrounding schools.

		In order to support newcomers to blend into the education system and the bilingual society they are part of, the Education Department has Language Centres located across the County, the Cabinet approved a new vision for 'Immersion Education System towards 2032 and beyond' in July 2021, investing £1.1 million of the Welsh Government's Welsh language education capital funds in order to establish new immersion education sites, and Bangor is one of the sites receiving investment. Headteachers and teachers at mainstream schools in the catchment area will be able to refer learners who do not speak Welsh or lack confidence in their speaking, writing, and listening skills in Welsh to the attention of the Immersion Education System. Recently, the staff of the Immersion Education System have also been holding training sessions on the principles of language immersion in the Foundation Phase for teachers and school assistants throughout the county, to ensure that appropriate immersion takes place in the Foundation Phase. In addition, the Language Centres have a long tradition of providing 'Gloywi laith' support to mainstream learners who need an extra boost with their skills and confidence in the Welsh language. As the new Immersion System has become operational since the beginning of January 2023, the Department will ensure the continuation of this practice of being able to offer language refresher sessions to children and young people in our schools, in order to further reinforce their skills and confidence in the Welsh language.
Socio- Economic Disadvantage	Positive / negative / none	By investing £3 million in Ysgol Hirael, we will ensure a suitable space for pupils in the catchment area and create the best conditions for the prosperity of the community and it would reduce the inequality in the condition and suitability of primary school buildings in the city Bangor. PSE lessons are held at the school which teach children about promoting equal opportunities. 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3.3 How does your proposal ensure that you work in accordance with the requirements of the Welsh Language Standards (Welsh Language (Wales) Measure 2011), to ensure that the Welsh language is not treated less favourably than English and that you seize every opportunity to

promote the Welsh language (beyond providing services bilingually) and increase opportunities to use and learn the language in the community?

Having considered what is in this assessment, we are of the opinion that investing in Ysgol Hirael would have a positive effect on the Welsh language, mainly because there would be more opportunities for children to use the Welsh language socially and educationally, as the new school will offer better resources for extra-curricular activities.

3.4 What other measures or changes could you include to strengthen or change the policy / practice in order to have a positive impact on people's opportunities to use the Welsh language, and to reduce or prevent any adverse effects that the policy / practice may have on the Welsh language?

It is not anticipated that investing in Ysgol Hirael will change the way the school deals with the Welsh language at present, and the school will continue to take advantage of every opportunity to promote the use of the Welsh language in the school and the community. Improving the building will be an opportunity for more possible community use which is an opportunity to further promote the Welsh language.

3.5 How does the proposal show that you have had due regard to the need to address inequality caused by socio-economic disadvantage? (Note that this is about closing inequality gaps rather than just improving outcomes for everyone)?

The proposal tackles inequality caused by socio-economic disadvantage by creating a first-class learning environment creating consistency across the county and ensuring equal opportunity for all learners to benefit from the very best conditions. It will be a means of reducing disadvantage for children in the catchment area and ensure that children with a physical impairment can stay in their catchment area.

3.6 What other measures or changes might you include to strengthen or change the policy / practice to show that you have had due regard to the need to reduce disproportionate outcomes as a result of socioeconomic disadvantage, in accordance with the Socio-Economic Act?

As a result of the proposal, the school will continue to operate in accordance with its policies and the expectations of the Education Department to reduce unequal results because of socio-economic disadvantage in accordance with the Socio-Economic Act.

4) Analysing the Results

4.1 Is the policy therefore likely to have a significant, positive impact on any of the above and what is the reason for this?

We believe that the proposed investment of £3 million to Ysgol Hirael is likely to have a positive impact on any of the equality features, and the Welsh language and on Socio-Economic disadvantage.

Investing in a new building for Ysgol Hirael would mean that the school will contain modern resources that will be suitable for pupils and staff who have any specific physical impairments. Investing in the school will promote equality of opportunity by improving the resources and the learning environment in order to eliminate the inequality that exists between primary schools in the Bangor catchment area. This will be a means of promoting equal opportunities for all children in the catchment area and the community. It is anticipated that a significant investment in Ysgol Hirael will create the very best conditions to support the prosperity of the Welsh language among the children and the community and the wider area. It will have a positive effect on the Welsh language, mainly, because there would be more opportunities for children to use Welsh socially and educationally, as the new school will offer better resources for carrying out more activities outside of school hours.

Our most important principle is to ensure that the welfare of the learners is central to everything. Therefore, investing and securing better resources that improve the experience of every pupil, and better buildings is an effort to improve the learning environment and the learning experience for Ysgol Hirael pupils, whatever their background, age, ability, gender, race and nationality.
